August Theme Cub Scouts: Waves of Fun Webelos Activity Badges: Forester and Naturalist

Applauses and Cheers


Swimmer's Applause. Pretend to take several strokes forward, then clap hands.

Come Up for Air Cheer. Crouch to pretend you are underwater. As you rise to the surface, say, "Glub, glub, glub." When you are standing again, your head is above water and you can say, "YEA!"

Rainstorm Applause. Start by gently patting knees alternately to simulate light rain. Pat harder and harder to increase the noise, then switch to clapping as the "storm" reaches its height. With a hand signal have everyone shout "Boom!" to represent thunder. Then gradually decrease the hand clapping and then patting the knees softer and softer until the storm is over.

Edible Aquarium

Make an edible aquarium in a cup. This is a great party treat you can make with your child.



You will need:

Blue Jell-O Gummy fish Graham crackers clear plastic cups

- Crush graham crackers into crumbs for the aquarium "gravel."
- ✓ Put about ½ inch of crumbs into the bottom of each clear plastic cup.
- ✓ Make blue Jell-O according to the directions on the box.
- ✓ Pour into clear plastic cups. Let them cool in the refrigerator until partially set about an hour.
- ✓ When they're partially set, place a few gummy fish in each cup.
- ✓ Put them in the refrigerator until they're completely set. Eat and enjoy!




