Dear Friends,

Summer is upon us and I know most of you will be taking off for summer camp or Philmont or other high adventure activities. I hope everyone has a terrific time. Scout leaders, while you're out there enjoying the great outdoors, you might use some of that time around the campfire to talk about what we will be facing when you return.

First, we will be looking at holding roundups as our schools start again. Has your unit added any new members in the last six months? If not, think about how you can recruit new Scouts and parents. If you're working in a Troop, how often do your visit your feeder Pack?

If you're a Cub leader, do you have someone visiting nearby Troops? You need to be familiar with the strengths and weakness of the Troops that

your Cubs might join when they graduate. Your input can be critical to insuring a smooth transition from Cubs to Scouts.

Second, don't forget rechartering will begin soon. Have you assigned someone to review last year's submittal to begin updating the information? Taking time to do vour homework now will pay off by making the recharter process go much smoother.

If you need assistance, please call your unit commissioner. If you don't know who your commissioner is, just call me and I'll make sure someone comes to your assistance.

One final thought. The Journey to Excellence program is our standard. Have reviewed your unit's progress? Do you know what level you have achieved? If not, download the form from the national website, burn a few copies and night while you're some enjoying a relaxing moment, hand out those forms to your Scouters and the PLC, and go over each category. What do the numbers reveal? Bronze, gold or silver? How close is your unit to achieving the next level? What changes can you make now in your program to attain a higher standard? Give everyone a chance to have their say, especially the Senior Patrol Leader and Patrol Leaders. Looking at where you are now might just give you time to add a few points to your score before the year ends.

Finally, have a great summer. I am constantly amazed by the high level of performance of the units in our District. Thank you for all you are doing to bring Scouting to our youth.





If you are an adult, please look into becoming a merit badge counselor. With over 100 badges, there is at least one you are an expert in. The scouts in our district need you!



#### **Reading Merit Badge Requirements**

- 1. Do EACH of the following:
  - Learn how to search your library's card catalog or computerized catalog by author, title, and subject.
  - b. With the assistance of your merit badge counselor or a librarian, select six books of four different types (such as poetry, drama/plays, fiction, nonfiction, biographies, etc.). Ask your librarian or counselor about award-winning books that are recommended for readers your age and include at least one of those titles.
  - c. Find the books in the library catalog. With your counselor's or a librarian's assistance, locate the books on the shelves.
  - d. Read each book. Keep a log of your reading that includes the title of the book, the pages or chapters read, the date you completed them, and your thoughts about what you have read so far. Discuss your reading with your counselor. Using your log as a reference, explain why you chose each book and tell whether you enjoyed it and what it meant to you.
- 2. Read about the world around you from any two sources--books, magazines, newspapers, the Internet (with your parent's permission), field manuals, etc. Topics may include sports, environmental problems, politics, social issues, current events, nature, religion, etc. Discuss what you have learned with your counselor.
- 3. Do ONE of the following:
  - a. From a catalog of your choice, fill out an order form for merchandise as if you intended to place an order. Share the completed form with your counselor and discuss it.
  - b. With your parent's permission, locate at least five Web sites that are helpful for your Scouting or other activities. Write the Internet addresses of these sites in your log. Talk with your counselor or a librarian about safety rules for using the Internet.
- 4. With your counselor's and your parent's permission, choose ONE of the following activities and devote at least four hours of service to that activity. Discuss your participation with your counselor.
  - a. Read to a sick, blind, or homebound person in a hospital or in an extended-care facility.
  - b. Perform volunteer work at your school library or a public library.
  - c. Read stories to younger children, in a group or individually.

#### **HOW ARE RECIPIENTS PICKED?**

Patch recipients will be picked randomly in three drawings.

The first drawing will be held Aug. 1, 2011, and will include all entries received between April 12 and July 31, 2011. The second drawing will be held Sept. 1, 2011, and will include all entries received between April 12 and Aug. 31, 2011. The final drawing will be held Oct. 3, 2011, and will include all entries received between April 12 and Sept. 30, 2011.

#### WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO PARTICIPATE?

Can you pitch a tent, find your way, and bandage an ankle using only materials in your pack? Are you prepared to do any of these in rain, snow, sleet, or heat? If so, the National Outdoor Awards are for you. There is nothing virtual about these awards—you can earn them only by demonstrating both knowledge and experience in the outdoors. So, if you are a Boy Scout or Varsity Scout and think you are tough and disciplined enough to hike or ride the miles, camp the nights, and run the rivers or lakes, then read on and see if the National Outdoor badges or possibly the National Medal for Outdoor Achievement could be for you!

#### National Outdoor Badges for Camping, Hiking, Aquatics, Riding, and Adventure

Now when a Scout excels in outdoor participation, there are new awards to show for it! This program, conceived by the National Camping Task Force of the BSA®, includes a series of five badges designed to recognize a Boy Scout or Varsity Scout who has exemplary knowledge and experience in performing high-level outdoor activities.

The award consists of five emblem segments positioned around the perimeter of a beautiful center emblem. All are embroidered in full color. The segments represent five areas of emphasis: Riding, Hiking, Camping, Aquatics, and Adventure, with rigorous requirements to earn each segment. The center emblem features an outdoor scene with fleur-de-lis and the words "National Outdoor Awards".

#### BEFORE THE WORKSHOP ...

- 1. Be familiar with the 2008 edition of the Coin Collecting Merit Badge booklet. At the workshop, Scouts will review the requirements.
- Collect and bring five examples of the same coin type, but in different conditions (Requirement 3).
- 3. Collect and bring five different state quarters you have acquired from circulation (Requirement 6). The dates do not have to be the same.
- 4. Collect and bring a date set of U.S. coins currently in circulation (Requirement 7). This type set must include one specimen each of the 1 cent, 5 cents, 10 cents, 25 cents, 50 cents, and dollar. The dates do not have to be the same.
- 5. Collect and bring a date set of U.S. coins (Requirement 9d) or one of the other collections for requirement 9. The set for requirement 9d can be of any one denomination (1 cent, 5 cents, 10 cents, or 25 cents) and must include one (1) coin of every year, from the year the Scout was born through 2010. Any mint is acceptable. All coins must be of the same denomination.

#### AT THE WORKSHOP ...

Everyone will learn a lot about collecting U.S. coins. There will be special *free* coin collecting gift bags for all attendees. Bring only the coins required for the merit badge. Please leave the rest of your collection at home.

#### AT THE WORKSHOP CONTINUED ...

Scouts will complete other requirements during the workshop and then will be reviewed. Parents and adult leaders are welcome and encouraged to attend. Check-in begins an hour before the workshop, please plan to arrive at least 30 minutes early. We encourage you to allow ample time before or after the workshop for Scouts to explore the collector exhibits and the coin show. The show is open 10:00am to 4:00pm on Saturday.

#### SCOUTMASTERS...

Please provide Scouts with signed Merit Badge Cards and ask them to complete all personal information (name, address, etc.). Certified Merit Badge Counselors will be leading the workshop and will sign the cards upon completion of the requirements. Tell your scouts to bring notepads and pencils, and completed type and date set of coins. Remind Scouts to wear their complete Scout uniform less merit badge sash. Scoutmasters should provide a copy of this flyer to Scouts planning to attend the workshop so they can study the requirements.


