

There are many council events


happening - WEBELOS Woods is the first weekend of November along with a new event at Camp Balboa and right before Thanksgiving is the Shoot Out up at Mataguay.



- 5. Entries may not stop on the parade route. Performances must take place while moving.
- 6. No commercial advertising other than commercial sponsor names.
- 7. No discharge of firearms or fireworks.
- 8. Entries may not make loud noises or have disruptive activities. This includes excessive use of sirens, very loud music, or any other sound that may disturb other entries nearby.
- 9. All motorized entries are required to have a minimum 5 lb., 2A, 10BC rated portable fire extinguisher available to the driver. The fire marshal does a spot check during staging!
- 10. Any entry that will use fire (such as fire batons), will need to have the proper equipment with them, as dictated by the local fire marshal. All such entries are checked during staging.
- 11. All floats should be constructed with noncombustible or flame retardant materials.
- 12. Floats can be no more than 14 feet wide due to the islands in Main Street near Alvarado.
- 13. All passengers on floats must be offloaded at the end of the parade route. Only highway-legal vehicles with seat belts will be allowed to transport passengers beyond the end of the parade route.
- 14. Any entry that is not legal on a public highway must be transported or trailered beyond the end of the parade route.
- 15. Entries are **REQUIRED TO PRESENT A HOLIDAY THEME**. The Chamber of Commerce reserves the sole right to turn away any unit deemed not in keeping with the holiday spirit prior to, or during, the parade.




